

Pondering Good Ideas

This morning, while driving south on I-5, I noted how the roadside and some of the hills were draped in golden blossoms. The "treat for the eyes shrub" was Scotch Broom. I trust that many of you know that this highly invasive non-native plant is not just an innocent giver of beauty. Allergy sufferers know that its pollen can be a particularly difficult irritant. While it was introduced as an ornamental back in the 1850's, it now takes over landscapes crowding out native plants.

Ivy is another ornamental that when left unchecked, is deadly to native plants. Himalayan Blackberries have, likewise taken over many fence rows and ravines and, sometimes, whole valleys.

Why the heck did anyone ever plant these troublesome plants in the first place?

Well, no doubt, it seemed like good idea at the time. The plants were lovely or the fruit was sweet.

In my life, many things that seemed like a good thing at the time have become problematic. In my yard, I have a very fun Chinese Lantern plant that I planted at the top of a rock wall, hoping that these notorious spreaders would cascade down the slope. They had their own ideas though, and are now spreading across my young corn patch.

I can offer many examples of life choices that seemed like a good idea at the time. They range from career and financial decisions to becoming involved in a relationship. Each choice seemed like a good idea at the time.

Later, I discovered that I had made a mistake.

(continued from previous page) I make mistakes. People make mistakes. The key question is, what do we do after we realize that something, that seemed like a good idea at the time, may not have been such a good idea after all?

What do we do?

Well with plants we simply trying to undo the harm. I have volunteered in several invasive plant mitigation projects. I sometimes call it rooting out evil, but it's actually trying to undo an error that once seemed like a good idea.

Sometimes I learn from my mistakes. No more Chinese lantern plant in my yard.

I remember, too, to forgive. The sweetness of wild blackberries helps me to, for the most part, forgive their invasive nature.

I try to do the same with people. I am not saying forget, but forgive.


The most difficult of all is to forgive myself. But I strive to do that. It means letting go of my own emotional energy around a past error, to stop beating myself over the past. Such recrimination is of little to no value. So, I seek to remember, so that I can learn, and to forgive.

There is reading in our hymnal that calls us "to forgive ourselves and each other and begin again in love." I recite it to myself often and, sometimes, I remember to do so. When I do it is, like a wild blackberry, very sweet.

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MAY 2024 MINISTER'S REPORT TO THE BOARD

I was honored this month to do some of the core work in Ministry when, in collaboration with my colleague Donna, we met with family and friends to create a Celebration of life that honored the wishes of the deceased for such a service and met the needs of many.

With limited success I have continued to reach out to members about potential Board service. Some who declined Board positions have agreed to do more here in other areas of congregational life.

The administrative side of ministry continues to take a significant amount of my time.

- Budget has also taken time as I first tried to mesh earlier budget conversations and some recommendations with my own professional recommendations to craft a budget, which the Board reviewed, amended, and approved provisionally at the April Meeting. Additional effort went into trying to capture and help format that Draft Budget in a manner that helps facilitate what will become the Boards recommended Budget, which will be reviewed by all and acted upon at the Annual Congregational Meeting at the end of the month.
- I also spent time on careful review of the By Laws and recommending some corrections and clarifications. Changes to this document will also, after Board review, be submitted to the Congregation.
- In addition I spent time this month in continuing conversations with members, formers
 members, and staff about several conflicts from the past that have not been fully resolved. I
 continue to seek ways in which our history can best help guide us into our shared future both
 in terms of individual issues and supporting a culture of open and inclusive communication.
- I continue to spend time on Personnel. If we are able to establish a Personnel Committee, and find skilled folks willing to be part of it, in the next church year, that would be a positive step.

I hope many will join in a Congregational Conversation about future options including internship and or continuing my consulting ministry and possible staffing partnerships with other UU communities in order to better access if and how such positions can best serve the longings and the needs of many.

It feels little strange to be winding down my current contracted ministry with all of you. I am glad we are planning to have continuing relationship through regular presence in your pulpit and additional work with you as either a consultant or as an intern supervisor in 24-25.

The Monthly Book Report MaryAnne Balzer, Librarian

"Wanted: Banned Books." "With Book banning on the rise, Beacon Press and UU Congregations are fighting literary censorship."

This is the title and opening remarks of a very important article featured in the *UU World* Spring/Summer 2024 issue beginning page 32.

"Book banning threatens democracy because it chips away at a person's right to choose what they want to read and believe in, according to Beacon Press, the 170-year-old publisher associated with the UUA." The article goes on to say: "Libraries, often one-stop environments for people to access a breadth of information and services and historical defenders of the freedom to read, are in the crossfire of book banning battles."

As you browse the issue I would urge you to read this very important article about your freedom to pursue knowledge. The book banning craze is not just about someone's idea of pornography. The books include titles I stocked at my past church: An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz, and White Fragility: Why it's So Hard for White People to Talk about Racism by Robin DiAngelo. (NY Times #1 best seller list) These are books published by/sold by Beacon Press.

Important current books are being subject to banning; books that inform and open the eyes and mind to the problems in American culture. We as a Congregation need

to stand up in support of reading freedom and access for all people. If we do not stand up for everyone's freedom to read, who will stand up for us when they come for our UU books?


A Message from Chaplain Donna Smith:
